Traditional comprehension reflects conscious preparation for the next seven generations. Every thought, word and deed has at its foundation *malama 'āina* - take care of your family, take care of the land – in anticipation of those who have yet to come! Every generation likes to think they are improving on the last. That progress is inevitable. That

the future holds less suffering and misery than the past. But the truth is some things never change, especially those places made sacred by our ancients - forever! History has a way of repeating itself. It's just that most people don't live long enough to see it happen. Our *mo'olelo* - traditional comprehension - however, keeps alive the mandates of *kupuna ma* - those whom we choose to follow.
