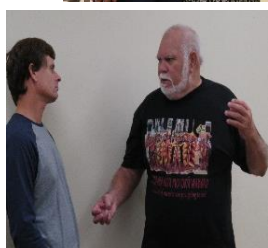

Kanaka Maoli scholar Lilikalā Kame‘eleihiwa goes into depth about the illegal overthrow and occupation in her work *Native Land and Foreign Desires*, summarized in the passage:

Although Senator Blount’s investigative report to the U.S. Congress vindicated Queen Lili‘uokalani and recommended her restoration to the Hawaiian throne, today we Hawaiians still await American justice and have become like foreigners in the ‘Āina of our ancestors. Once Hawai‘i became an American territory in 1900, foreigners prohibited Hawaiian language and beat Hawaiian children for speaking it. As a result, we became ashamed to be Hawaiian. Now foreigners behave as though Hawaiians don’t belong in Hawai‘i, calling the Native people “immigrants.” There is a great lack of *pono* in Hawai‘i today as a direct result of our loss of ‘Āina and sovereignty.
