6.23.2k16...Tom Penna and the map of Oʻahu on display at Nā Mea Hawaiʻi. This map of Oʻahu is 10ft. wide and over 6ft. high. This is the largest traditional place name map of Oʻahu in terms of original coastline, streams, number of place names, and so on. An overlay of multitudes of maps resulted in this perception.



Intention: Penna says, "Understanding the 'original' strategy of the island we can have a clearer vision of what needs to be done to help restore health to the island." Place names were often given by the ancestors through  $h\bar{o}$  'ailona – audible, visual and atmospheric occurrences - that described conditions specific to that place. Place names have been preserved in old survey maps, archives and old family mo 'olelo. The story of the 'āina – the message. This map is a guideline to interpret direction. What steps do we need to take in order to participate in a long-term, multigenerational, healing process for Oʻahu? We prepare for the next seven generations. Our  $k\bar{u}puna$  have prayed for generations to make right, bring into harmony and balance, in order to heal our land and the people of our Nation. Now it is time for action. We are manifesting their prayers which are literally an intricate part of the land, 'āina. Call Nā Mea Hawai'i Ward Center, for the scheduled visits with Tom Penna on the subject of maps and lunar cycles...eō "My prayers are for all people to start at pu'uhonua Kūkaniloko and radiate outward, as do the concentric rings of the piko, spreading globally. Walk beholding the heartbeat of the land and listen; and then DO..." Mahalo, TOM PENNA

*Pōhaku 'o Kamana'olana -* Wall of Hope for the beloved people of our Nation...*eō* 

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


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**7.11.2k16...We** are *Koʻolaupoko ʻĀina Momona*, a summer enrichment program in Kāneʻohe, Oʻahu. We are a family based program made up of *keiki* and *ʻohana* from Koʻolaupoko Oʻahu. Our mission is to raise true *kamaʻāina* of their *moku* of *Oʻahualua* by surveying their land from *mauka* to *makai*. Our non-profit, *Māʻilikūkahi 'Āina Momona Academy*, seeks to encourage others to do the same in their own *moku*, in their own style. 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**7.14.2k16...Statewide DOE/OHE** Principals, Staff and Teachers visited Kūkaniloko in the early afternoon. Protocol began with a procession around the perimeter of Kūkaniloko Birthstones. The Hawaiian Civic Club of Wahiawā families awaited their arrival. *Mea Pule* La'akapu Lenchanko greeted our guests with a beautiful chant honoring each of the islands represented and their *nā ali'i* before them. Site interpretation followed. Forty of our visitors and



their chaperones sat captivated by the *mo`olelo* as presented by *kia'i* Tom Lenchanko. Small break-away groups met to jointly process the day of *Huaka'i 'o Kūkaniloko*. **Kūkaniloko**, **truly a place of education in a classroom with no walls**.

7.19.2k16...Lokahi Foundation's "The Change Academy" Na ke'ena hana ka'apuni – rotating workshops. Several members of the Hawaiian Civic Club of Wahiawā met with 18 exchange students who were invited from Japan as well as from a few Hawai'i schools to participate in this unique summer experience. Camp Erdman was the host site. HCCW members were at five stations where each small group visited for a 15 minute period. Interpreters were part of each team as most spoke Japanese/with some English. The atmosphere was that of musical chairs. Laughter,

Station 5 - Arts and Crafts: Lauhala with HCCW lālā 'ōiwi Kupuna Pila and lālā ho'okama Kupuna Evelina Short. Together they made lauhala pen holders. Each haumana received a makana of an Aloha pen with pen holder after their lesson. Everyone used their new pens to sign our Friends of Kūkaniloko Record Log.



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**Station 4 –** *Lua Protocol* with HCCW's *Kumu Kahu* Peter Kawaimaka Lonoae'a was held outdoors near the beach. Appropriate protocols were taught to the *kane* and to the *wahine* together in preparation for their *Kahea* for permission to enter Kūkaniloko Birthstones on their visit the next day. *Ho'omaika'i* on your excellence of execution...







**Station 3 - Mo'olelo - Traditional comprehension of Kūkaniloko** with *Kumu* Robert Lopaka Oliveira, Jr. who shared our Educational Kūkaniloko Display. Purpose was to introduce *haumana* to our *wahi pana*. Wednesday's site visit would be a short hour for protocol as well as interpretation. A preview was an excellent way to prepare visitors.
