He arrived in Wahiawā early and wanted to come out to Kūkaniloko Birthstones State Monument. He was met by *kia'i* Tom Lenchanko, Vicki Pakele and Kalimapau. He toured the grounds with Tom walking alongside him, pointing out key land marks and the view corridor of Kūkaniloko. They discussed planting '*Iliahi* as the next phase of our initiative. In 2012, KŪKANILOKO "TO ANCHOR THE CRY FROM WITHIN"...Healing our 'Āina Phase I: Hawaiian Civic Club of Wahiawā Initiative for Restoration of the Native Ecosystem of Kūkaniloko, Līhu'e, O'ahu, ko Hawai'i paeaina was funded by a \$2,500 Grant from Hawaii Maoli to purchase onsite trees and plants.

10.12.2k16...A captivated audience of HCCW members listened to the mo'olelo of 'Iliahi (Sandalwood) by our guest speaker Leigh Wai Doo. He shared the history of sandalwood in the islands. 'Iliahi is symbiotic, meaning two different organisms living in a close relationship, beneficial to both. For example the tiny 'iliahi symbiotic with the 'ōhia lehua on the right. The demands for Sandalwood from China during the reigns of Kamehameha I & II were great. Kapu was eventually ignored and soon supply was depleted. Although there are many scattered 'Iliahi trees to be found today, there will never again be the forests of old unless we take the time to plant new trees. We asked Leigh Wai Doo to share his mana'o to inspire us. The Native Ecosystem of Kūkaniloko will be restored and reforested. Our children and grandchildren can then walk among our Native plants of koa, 'iliahi, 'ōhia lehua, lonomea,



ho'awa, lama, loulu hiwa, 'a'ali'i, 'u'ulei, 'alahe'e, 'akia, mamaki, 'ala'alawainui, kupukupu, and laua'e, healing our 'āina.

Kūpuna Wisdom: "Hahai ka ua i ka nahele. Rain follows the forest." You know, with all that is going on right now



in the Dakotas...the proposed pipeline cutting through mountains, forests, and streams...and the record heats and colds we have all been feeling in the last decade.... our *kūpuna* understood the impact of the human world on the environment. "Hahai ka ua i ka nahele. Rain follows the forest." We often forget basic geologic and biological science we first learned as young children. Plants breathe. It's called transpiration. When the forest breathes, in Hawaiian language we call that 'ohu. When transpiration occurs, the water evaporates and creates clouds. Forests, mountains, and valleys literally create clouds. When airstreams hit the mountain, the air rises and cools, forming

clouds. When the temperature becomes cool enough, and enough water vapor has collected within the cloud, we have rain. Rain cools the environment and provides valuable nutrition for the planet and all who live upon it. Ever wonder why we have record heatwayes and severe winter storms coming at all weird points of the year now? Because we don't have forests to maintain the natural balance of the earth. Instead, we have high-rise buildings, cement, fossil fuel exhaust, and now pipelines - all of which have destroyed forests in order to exist.
