Vandals have been an ongoing problem at the birthsite for many, many years. Often there are perimeter encampments. Kūkaniloko Birthstones State Monument is still within jurisdiction of the DLNR/State of Hawaii. After contact and a report, DOCARE Officers are often sent out. Assessment and remedy are attempted, especially with vagrants who set up make-do shelters and campsites where ever they want.
