Here we see the value of the *kahako*. *Ka Po'e Kahiko*, our ancients, often carved images of our Hawaiian deity, Kalaipahoa, from *nioi*, his most favorite sacred tree. He was believed to be able to ride comets across the skies over Hawai'i nei.





The closing moments of the 2k21 Spring Equinox were so beautiful...A chant for Kānehoalani was offered by Ka'imi, Kawailehua and Jeff as the sun set into the *Piko o Wahine Hāpai* silhouetted along the Wai'anae Range in the west. Kānehoalani is a peak upon the Ko'olau Range on the eastside of O'ahu that simultaneously connects both the Waianae and the Ko'olau ranges. Majestic Kānehoalani of the Ko'olau mountain range overlooks the bay where the Hōkūle'a was originally launched in 1975, honoring our greatest voyaging *Nā Ali'i* of the past...

Conceptual Master Plan. All agreed that the "past is always present..." history of *kapuahuawa* needed to be shared in order to accomplish the level of development appropriate for the '*Āina* surrounding this *wahi kapu*, sacred site. Targeted lands for this development do not include the 5 acres designated by the State of Hawai'i as Kūkaniloko Birthstones State Monument. Instead, focus will be on the 511 acres surrounding the site bordered by Kamananui Road, Kamehameha Highway and south Lake Wilson. Noi'i 'ike hana lima kila lani o ka po'e kahiko ...

Speaking both generally and for myself personally, cultural astronomy requires knowledge of the culture under study to a greater extent than archaeoastronomy does.

My research and writing focus is about the **Cultural Astronomy of Hawai**`i. Cultural astronomy, formerly and often still called ethnoastronomy, is the study of knowledges associated with astronomy and the characteristics and functions of celestial objects and events in a specific culture, in my case that of pre-contact Hawaii. Cultural astronomy can and frequently does include archeological sites and elements of archaeology, but does not involve invasive techniques such as excavation. Archaeoastronomy is the study of astronomy apparent at an archaeological site or by structural elements, walls, doors, windows, paths, streets, and so on, and often does include excavation and other invasive techniques.

These Niu have reigned for many years towering more than 60 feet in the air. They were brought down in a two-day undertaking. However, before they were removed. Sheila had made arrangements with several kanaka across the island to take the trunks and use them. Cut to different sizes, most of the Niu logs will be fashioned into pahu drums. Noelani's haumāna will make them as family projects. Pahu will be sounded from Palehua to Kūkaniloko. Nine strong Royal Palms were planted in their place. EŌ
