They discussed HCCW's participation in the restoration of Native plants project here at the newly designed Kaukonahua Park. Hawaiian Civic Club of Wahiawā members and your 'ohana are invited to join us on Sunday, August 11th at 9 am for the planting of our first 'ōhia melemele tree in honor of Mr. Hiram Diamond. Dedication and blessing by HCCW Kahu, Peter Lonoae'a will open our ceremonies. Hiram Diamond of the Hawaiian Civic Club of Wahiawā and The Friends of Kūkaniloko, was instrumental in having Kūkaniloko Birthstones recognized as a State Monument and placed on both the State Register of Historic Sites in 1972 and the National Register of Historic Sites in 1973.

The Hawaiian Civic Club of Wahiawā will provide 'uki'uki for each HCCW member to plant for their families. The 'uki'uki was plentiful in the uplands of Wahiawā, Halemano and Līhu'e. The tiny berries were crushed into a purple dye and used for the *kapa* that covered the birthing stone, *Kūkaniloko*. Thus, the term "born in the purple" acknowledges the high rank of the newborn. Remember "...the gods, yes, the gods would send a child; a child of character, strength and vision: possessing the mental acumen and moral rectitude imbued from on high to lead our people toward a life filled with peace and prosperity." HCCW appreciates the opportunity to participate in this restoration of Native plants project as a stepping stone to the restoration of the entire Native ecosystem of *kalana* Kūkaniloko. We begin here at the entrance to Wahiawā Town. Parking is free at the Municipal Parking Lot located at Avocado and Kamehameha Highway. Join us on Sunday at 9 am and bring some water for the newly planted...*eō*

7.29.13...HCCW/OHA Stewardship Proposal...The Hawaiian Civic Club of Wahiawā and The Friends of Kūkaniloko were contacted by Ikaika Nakahashi, Natural Resources Manager for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) on July 3rd, 2013. His letter was to notify HCCW that the management of Kūkaniloko Birthstones has been transferred from DLNR and Hawai'i State Parks to OHA; and that OHA is now responsible for approving on-site activities. A written proposal was requested from HCCW for the stewardship of *kalana* Kūkaniloko. HCCW has complied and submitted a proposal to OHA.
