She spoke to the University of Hawai'i haumana of Hawai'inuiākea School of Hawaiian Knowledge following their site interpretation at Kūkaniloko with *kia'i* Tom Lenchanko. Martha's Ph.D. is in Archaeoastronomy. She is a teacher, an award winning artist and the author of several books. In an hour she took everyone back in time defining "significance of the place on earth that is Kūkaniloko." The rising and setting of the stars and constellations in relationship to this place was known, understood, and taught by *papakilohoku*.



She shared *mo'olelo*, traditional comprehension, of the stars and constellations and their movement in relationship *kalana* Kūkaniloko, as well as the Wai'anae and Ko'olau mountain ranges. View corridors at the *piko* are highly treasured...eō

6.28.16 - 7.1.16...The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Installation of "cattle-gates" at the entrance to the Kūkaniloko access road took place during this time. The "Warning" signs below are posted. One sign addresses the possibility of falling coconuts and branches. The other sign reminds visitors to have ...*respect for our Wahi Kapu*, -No standing or sitting on stones; -Do not move or wrap rocks; -Do not trample native plants; -No drugs, alcohol, or smoking; -Service animals only; -No open fires; and -No loitering. The fine print reads: *Please do not disturb these archaeological sites. Damage to these historic sites is punishable under HRS Chapter 6E-11 OHA Office of Hawaiian Affairs.* "NO TRESPASSING" signs are posted throughout the OHA 511 acres. Gates are locked in the open position until further notice. The chain remains across the access road entrance, preventing vehicle entry.
